It was pleasing to see the referee, in my opinion using a degree of common sense, only brandishing yellow cards on both occasions.

Bury managed to be the more clinical in front of goal on the night & came away with a 2–1 win from a game that had draw written over it all night long.

At last our long standing home unbeaten record has come to an end, and we now need to dust ourselves down, gather our self-belief and look to start the second half of the season today, as we mean to go on.

Looking at the season to date it could be fair to say that possibly we could be 4-5 points better off than we are and a few places higher in the table but hey that's the nature of this game and we must not dwell on things we can't change.

With players coming back to fitness, competition for places fierce, and our fate being in our own hands, I think we can all look forward to an exciting second half of the season.

# THE OTHER SIDE HULLBRIDGE SPORTS FC

Records show that Hullbridge United Football Club was formed by a group of local men, fronted by the then proprietor of the Anchor Inn, a Mr. A. W. Moss. He owned a room behind the pub known as Buff's Hall. This was where the club held its first meeting. A Mr. Brown generously allowed the club to play on his land, on the corner of Pooles Lane and Long Lane.

Hullbridge United's first colours were Green and Gold quartered shirts, White shorts and green socks, which, by an amazing coincidence, were the same colours as those on the flag flying outside the Anchor Inn! Affiliating to the Essex County FA in 1947, Hullbridge United entered the Southend & District League for the upcoming 1947-48 season. 1950-51 saw Hullbridge United reach their first Cup Finals. In the Section 'C' Final of the Southend Charity Competition, United beat Maxwell Sports 4-1. Four weeks later, in the Southend & District League's French Cup, Hullbridge faced Rochford Athletic but, somewhat unluckily, lost the Final by three goals to four.

After six seasons of Second Division football, 1951-52 saw Hullbridge finally gain promotion – and they did it in style, winning both the Championship and the French Cup. In the final, Hullbridge defeated the reserves of Great Wakering Rovers by three goals to nil. In all, the club played 28 matches that season, scoring an amazing 141 goals.

The summer of 1953 saw the club change its name to Hullbridge Sports. After a few poor seasons, times improved for the club when they won the 1956–57 Third Division Championship and the League's Shaw Cup.



They finished five points clear of Canvey Island Sports in the League and saw off Victory Athletic reserves 3-2 after extra time in the Cup Final. Suffering relegation at the end of the 1958-59 season, Sports' stay in the Third Division lasted but four seasons as, in 1962-63, 'Bridge won promotion as runner-up in the newly named Second Division with a dramatic final day victory to ensure promotion on goal average. Drawing 4-4 at home to Southwick Rovers, 'Bridge scored three goals in the final fifteen minutes to gain a 7-4 victory and promotion.

Another double was achieved during the 1965-66 season when Hullbridge won the First Division Championship and Section 'C' of the Southend Charity Competition – beating Southchurch Rovers 3-0 in a replay after a 2-2 draw. A respectable fifth-place finish was achieved in the Premier Division the following season, along with being French Cup finalists. 1968-69 saw Hullbridge finish bottom of the Premier Division but just three seasons later the club regained its Premier Division status, finishing runner-up to Canvey Island Amateur FC at the end of the 1971-72 season. Good cup runs that year saw the club reach the semi-final of the Ramuz Cup and the Fourth Round of the Essex Junior Cup.

In the late 1970s, the club decided it wanted its own ground. Negotiations with Rochford Council proved successful, and the club took control of 16.5 acres of farmland in Lower Road (at the top of Coventry Hill), with the club moving during 1980. Transformation of the site was slow, with the clubhouse not officially opened until 1983.

The end of the 1979-80 season saw Sports put six goals past the Southend Estuary 'keeper to win Section 'B' of the Southend Charity Competition. A move up to the newly formed Southend & District Alliance in 1982 found the club wanting. Finishes of sixth and eighth and First Round knockouts in the League Cup weren't exactly what the club had hoped for. The only bright spot was reaching the 1982-83 Southend Charity Shield Final, although they lost 0-4 to Rayleigh Town. Nevertheless, again, looking for a higher standard of football, Sports then joined the Essex Olympian League for the 1984-85 season. They immediately won promotion after finishing third in the Second Division.

At the end of the weather-hit 1987-88 season, Hullbridge (now in the Second Division again) brought home the Essex Intermediate League Cup, beating First Division Benfleet in the Final, held at the old New Writtle Street ground of Chelmsford City FC. After a 1-1 extra time draw, courtesy of a Mark Wood goal, Sports went into the replay 12 days later having played five League matches in between! However, after a goal-less 120 minutes, Sports won 5-4 on penalties.

Looking for a further climb up the non-league ladder, Hullbridge made improvements to the ground during 1989 so it passed the grade for senior football. 1990 saw the Essex County FA grant the club senior status and so the club joined the Essex Senior League for the 1990-91 season. Matt Petre had the honour of scoring the club's first goal in senior football when, on 25th August 1990, in the club's first match of the Essex Senior League season, he scored Sport's only goal in a 1-3 defeat by visitors Stansted, in front of a 163 crowd. At the end of




their first season, the club finished in a respectable 12th place.

The new floodlights were put to good use during the 1999-2000 season when, after seven cup-ties, the youthteam reached the Third Round (last 64) of the FA Youth Cup. Visitors Blackburn Rovers won the tie 6-0 in front of a crowd of over 800. After taking over the manager's hot seat during February 2006, Enrico Tiritera oversaw a gradual improvement in the club's fortunes on the pitch. The 2008-09 season showed a good improvement for the club, and they attained their highest number of points (41) over a 30-match programme. The club also reached the Quarter-finals of the East Anglian Cup for the first time.

In 2009-10 Hullbridge reached the Quarter-finals of the Essex Senior Cup, again for the first time, before losing narrowly 0-1 to Football League side Dagenham & Redbridge. The 2010-11 season saw Sports reach their first Cup Final as a senior club, the County FA's Tolleshunt D'Arcy Memorial Cup. Unfortunately, Sports were beaten 1-2 by Braintree Town.

Dan Braney and Mark Bliss took over the reins from Enrico Tiritera, who departed the club in March 2013. In their first full season, 2013-14, Dan and Mark guided the team to their best ever FA Vase Cup run, reaching the Fourth Round (last 32), before being beaten 1-3 by eventual winners Sholing FC. It was unfortunate that the club had to travel to Southampton for the fixture on a wet Tuesday evening in January. The team under Braney and Bliss took the new record of points that had been achieved in the 2008/09 season, finishing ninth with 53 points from a 38-game season, but the icing on the cake was winning the Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy, the first ever silverware as a senior club, beating Haringey Borough 1-0 in the final, Michael Edgar scoring the only goal.

Mark Bliss took sole charge of the team during the 2014/15 season and was joined by coach Steve Tapley.



Between them they took the club to its highest ever league position and points tally, finishing fourth in the Essex Senior League with 71 points and 73 goals along the way. With yet another Fourth Round FA Vase run, only losing away to Flackwell Heath FC. Mark and Steve decided to step down from the management of the men's senior side for the 2015/16 season and Hullbridge appointed its youngest ever management team installing Rob Hodgson as the new First Team Manager along with Aaron Hunwicks as the new Coach.

In their first season (2015/16) Rob Hodgson and Aaron Hunwicks took the club to new FA Cup heights by making Hullbridge Sports history and reaching the Second Qualifying Round, where they were unfortunately beaten by Grays Athletic of the Ryman Premier Division. It was a last 32 exit again in the FA Vase equalling previous records and demonstrating the FA Vase consistency shown from previous seasons.

In their second season (2016/17) running the First Team Rob Hodgson and Aaron Hunwicks found life more difficult as the side finished 11th

in the Essex Senior League and disappointing early exits from most of the cup competitions, but they did take the side to the second Tollshunt D'Arcy Memorial Cup Final in successive seasons but were unfortunately beaten again by Heybridge Swifts FC. Rob Hodgson and Aaron Hunwicks continued in the hot seat at the start of the 2017/18 season, but early exits from the FA Cup, Essex County Cup and poor league form saw an emotional farewell after the FA Vase victory over Wembley FC at Lower Road. Rob stayed for a short while to play for new manager Darren Manning, but Aaron left the club that had been his home since 2012 for pastures new.

New manager Darren Manning had one main objective after taking over and that was to keep the club in the Essex Senior League and he managed to achieve this finally finishing 15th (out of 21), but unfortunately, Hullbridge exited the FA Vase again under Darren in the last 32 away at Tring FC. 2018/19 saw Darren Manning's first full season at the helm and his side were playing at the newly renamed Ryan's Heating Stadium at Lower Road.

Darren and number two James Wakeling started the 2018/19 campaign in the Essex Senior League. In the first major cup competition of the 2018/19 season, Hullbridge went out of the FA Cup in the Preliminary Round away at Newmarket Town FC (2-1) and they didn't have much joy in the other cup competitions in Darren's first season, exiting all the other big competitions in a 6 week period, as they lost in the FA Vase (Newport Pagnell Town FC 0-2), followed by defeat in the BBC Essex Senior Cup (Hoddesdon Town FC 5-1), the Gordon Brasted Memorial Trophy (Stansted 0-3) and the BBC Essex Senior Cup (Coggeshall Town FC 1-2), but they made the Semi Final of the Tolleshunt D'Arcy Memorial Trophy losing to Brightlingsea Regent of the Bostik League (5-1).

In the league Darren and James overtook the previous management teams in highest

league points total achieving a total of 87 points and not only making Hullbridge history for the points total, but also winning the Essex Senior League and being promoted to the Isthmian League for the first time in the clubs 29 year history.

Hullbridge Sports first season at the highest level the club has played at in their history was, like most things around this time, interrupted by the COVID pandemic. Both the 2019–20 and 2020–21 seasons were terminated due to the virus. In their first season at this level, Hullbridge were in 16th place with 28 points from 27 matches when the season was terminated.

The following season, 2020-21, came to an abrupt halt even earlier with The Bridge in 16th place on 6 points from 5 matches.

Finally, The Bridge could complete a full season in the division at the third attempt in season 2021-22. This season is now famous for 'The Great Escape' as The Bridge staged an unbelievable rescue mission after appearing to be in an impossible position in December. A change in personnel on the pitch that included Tony Stokes, who led the team with all his vital experience and goalscoring contributions, plus some excellent additions brought in by newly installed managers, Steve Southgate and Rob Moore, combined to produce one of the most amazing turnarounds imaginable. The Bridge survived the rollercoaster ride and finished, yes 16th, with 39 points from 38 games.

The amazing run of form that produced 'The Great Escape' allowed The Bridge to survive and take their place in the Isthmian League North for the 2022-23 season as we celebrate 75 years of Hullbridge football and look forward to many more years to come.

Felixstowe & Walton United maintained their 100% winning start to 2023, coming from behind to beat lowly Tilbury at a chilly Chadfields ground. The home side took a surprise early lead through

debutant James Ewington but **Zak Brown** equalised in the 31st minute, beating the offside trap and coolly finishing. **George Clarke** put the Seasiders ahead on 48 minutes from close distance before the away side lived dangerously for a ten-minute spell, Tilbury seeing the woodwork and a goal line clearance from Billy Holland deny them. Felixstowe's win was confirmed on 83 minutes, **Callum Harrison** superbly beating two men and scoring low into the far corner.

**MATCH REPORT: STUART DAYNES** 



Felixstowe were without Joe Whight due to a hamstring injury, Charlie Warren slotting into the left back role. Leon Ottley-Gooch was also missing due to injury alongside Stuart Ainsley. Tilbury started with four debutants and a new manager in the dugout after a poor run of ten defeats from thirteen matches. From the first whistle it was clear that the bumpy pitch was going to limit flowing, passing football, but to both sides credit they adapted well and were both making good use of the space afforded to each team high up the field. Tilbury were unlucky not to score in the first minute when Ewington raced clear but he couldn't finish, the striker, making his debut, was not be denied though on 5 minutes, receiving the ball from the centre and beating his man to find himself clear in the box and he calmly stroked the ball past Robinson for the opening goal. The match then turned into a stop-start affair for a period, with plenty of breaks in play, including Noel Aitkens having to make an early exit with what looked like a



knee issue, and already, plenty of timewasting from the home side. A 30 yard volley was taken care of by Robinson on 13 minutes and George Clarke saw his 20 yard curling effort deflected just wide on 23 minutes. The opening half had not been pretty on the eye but the Seasiders soon loosened up after their enforced three week break and a through ball on 31 minutes saw **Zak Brown** beat the offside trap from near the half-way line to find himself one-on-one with the goalkeeper, any fears





that he had too much time to overthink it were unfounded as he coolly slammed the ball past the keeper to equalise. The always involved Josh Hitter curled a free kick from distance just over on 35 minutes as the away side took control of the play and so nearly went ahead on 45 minutes, Callum Harrison had looked on fire since replacing Noel Aitkens and his superb play out on the far right saw him jink past the

defence and deliver a pinpoint ball in to Zak Brown on the edge of the six yard box, he glanced his header towards the far post but saw it go agonisingly just wide. Another great chance was created just on the stroke of the whistle, Josh Hitter doing all the hard work before sending in a vicious attempt from 30 yards that the goalkeeper somehow got to and scrambled it round the post.

Felixstowe made a perfect start to the second half, taking the lead on 48 minutes, just after Zak Brown had seen the keeper get the better of him one-on-one in the box. A ball right across the goal line evaded the home defence and found Andre Hasanally at the far post, his shot from a yard out was somehow cleared, but only to **George Clarke** who smashed the ball into the net from close distance. That goal certainly woke the home side up and they had three unbelievable chances to equalise in the next ten minutes, a ball into the box on 51 minutes was side footed towards goal from 8 yards, the ball hit

Two more golden opportunities were squandered shortly after, with Billy Holland being the saviour with a stunning goal line clearance when a goal looked a certainty and some more desperate defending denying the Dockers once more. That brief spell of danger was all the home side could muster and Felixstowe again took control from then on, with Tilbury probably deflated at the sight of players like Ollie Canfer and Henry Barley being introduced off the bench, with both showing quality touches and assists. Callum Harrison again found space through the middle on 62 minutes but he shot wide, and Billy Holland headed just over from a corner on 72 minutes. Felixstowe had suffered a late equaliser at this venue last season, but fears of a repeat were quashed on 83 minutes when Harrison showed his class to score a third for the Seasiders. He beautifully beat two men on the edge of the box to create



space for himself and he confidently found the far corner of the net to seal the points. A fourth goal wasn't out of the question as first Zak Brown and Callum Harrison caused havoc yet again for the home defence who had chased them all game, Zak tried for goal when perhaps a pass would have been the better option, and Harrison curled a shot over from outside the area in injury time.

# PITCHING IN ISTHMIAN LEAGUE NORTH ROUND UP

Leaders AFC Sudbury have maintained a four point lead at the top despite Hashtaa's charge, but the Yellows faced the tricky challenge of a trip to third place Grays Athletic. Athletic were on their best run of the season, with six consecutive wins, but Sudbury once again brought home the bacon (non-meat products are also available) and delivered a win double, breaking home resistance with two late goals. Josh Stokes put them ahead with just eleven minutes to go, and then right at the end that man Nnamdi Nwachuku continued his incredible goalscoring run by adding his thirty second goal of the season - and he has only played twenty six times! Our image of that goal comes from Steve Screech.

**Hashtag United** put the best winning run in the country on the line as they headed to

Wroxham. The Tags last league defeat was at the hands of their closest title rivals back in November, since when they'd swept everything before them and had been scoring goals for fun. We knew that the Yachtsmen were unlikely to be pushovers, and they were given an advantage when Ben Brookes was dismissed for the visitors on ten minutes - and advantage they took when Harry Barker opened the scoring on fourteen minutes. It took only one minute for the ten men to equalise through Max Cornhill, and eight minutes before half time Percy Kiangebeni put them ahead. Tags then shot themselves in the other foot by picking up a second red card, Greg Halford departing, but somehow managed to add a third goal with nine men, Kiangebeni scoring from the spot. Ryan Miles set up a grandstand finish with the Yachtsmen's second goal six minutes from time, but that was that-twelve wins in a row for the Tags.

Lowestoft Town look to have almost recaptured their early season form, and were five games without defeat as they welcomed New Salamis to the seaside. Salamis travelled on the back of their first difficult run of the campaign, with only one win from six matches, and this one was close, but it went the way of the Trawler Boys, up to third. Jake Reed got the first goal of the game with twenty one minutes to go, and the lead was doubled in added time, Travis Cole volleying home. The hosts are, however, thirteen points behind

the Tags, seventeen behind the Yellows, as the title race looks to have only two horses.

Heybridge Swifts hoped to hold on to their top five spot as they travelled to Hullbridge Sports, and they looked to have the match won by half time, Callum Taylor's seventh minute opener and a second from Ross Wall giving them a two-nil lead. Sports made the closing stages interesting, pulling a goal back with eleven minutes left, Sam Elwood with it, but the visitors made sure, Rob Harvey making it three-one right at the end. Swifts have won six of the last seven meetings between the clubs, and are up to fourth-whilst Sports have lost four in a row.

Stowmarket Town, still without a permanent manager as we write, had lost three of their last four- a sequence which had seen them slip from the top five. Stow were on the road to Brentwood Town, the Blues, who defeated Stow in the play off Semi Final last season, having a rather average campaign. After a goalless first half the visitors made the breakthrough on forty nine minutes, Chris Casement with the goal, and although Bryan Ifeanyi brought the hosts level on sixty six minutes parity lasted only three minutes, Reggie Thompson-Lambe getting a winner and ensuring that Stow did the double over the Blues and closed to within a point of the top five.

Maldon & Tiptree welcomed East Thurrock United, and the two delivered a thrilling first half. An own goal gave the Rocks, who had lost their previous three matches, a tenth minute lead, only for Terrell Egbri to equalise just before the half hour. Brian Moses quickly restored the visitors lead, only for Harry Phillips to just as quickly cancel it out for the Jammers. The winner came five minutes from time, and it went to the hosts, Danny Nesbitt delighting the home faithful and sending his side up to thirteenth.

**Witham Town**, who had perhaps forgotten what winning felt like, became reacquainted

with it as they welcomed **Bury Town**. Witham had lost their last nine matches and were desperate not to create an imperfect ten, whilst Bury had only one win from their last seven. The game had just one goal, and it was delight for the hosts, Jamahl Godward scoring it on sixty eight minutes as his side climbed to fifteenth.

Basildon United, six points above the bottom four, travelled to face bottom side Coggeshall Town. The Seed Growers had improved of late but that improvement hadn't transformed their results, and they kicked off still without a league win all season and ten points from safety - but that was to change, in the last two minutes of the match! When Callum Fitzer put the Bees ahead on eighty three minutes it looked as if the points were heading back to Basildon, but the Seed Growers levelled two minutes from time, George Frodsham with the goal. Right at the end that first win arrived as Josh Osude made it two.

Finally, we had eighteenth v nineteenth as Great Wakering Rovers welcomed Gorleston. Rovers, under new management, were without a win since October 8th - and the two sides delivered a six goal first thriller, with four of them going the way of the visitors. Connor Ingram opened the scoring for the Greens, and Ross Gifedder quickly made it two on twenty five minutes, and although Jay Nash halved the arrears for Rovers it was three-one to the visitors at the break, George Keys with Gorleston's third. Four minutes from time Christy Finch made it four-one, and a stoppage time Ade Adedoja goal for Rovers wasn't much of a consolation. The hosts were down to ten men by then, Billy Johnson seeing a late red card. That's two away wins in a row for Gorleston, who move to within two points of safety.

DID YOU see the video of former Cardiff City manager Mark Hudson on social media recently? The first part shows him telling his sons he has been appointed assistant and their pride is clear to see.

In the second part, he is telling them he is out of a job and they will be moving again, but not to worry: "That's football".

That is indeed and unfortunately we're probably all a bit guilty of forgetting the human side of it.

Away from the pitch there is a reality we don't always see. Occasionally we get little glimpses into it, like with Hudson's video. As football fans on the outside, it's easy to see everything as black and white, winning and losing.

If a player doesn't play very well, it's because he's not up to it. More often than not, we don't stop to consider what else might be going on. In this role I've come to learn there are often deeply personal reasons why a player might not be performing – or why a manager might not be able to get the results despite the fact they're putting in all the hours they can.

Hereford manager Josh Gowling saw Hudson's video and it resonated. In Sunday's NLP he took on the subject in his column to give us a unique insight into what it is like as a Non-League gaffer.

He wrote: "When we lose a game, my missus will message me: Are you ok? I have a four-hour drive home after the majority of our games. That's a lot of time to go over things in my head.

"When I get home I will get a nice cuddle from her and my kids, but she knows I won't be in a good place.

"Look I've chosen to do this so it's not an



excuse, but it can take you away from your family in an emotional sense.

"When you're with your kids but your team is on a three-game losing streak, you're not fully present.

"I'm sure many other managers will say the same. This is your life. When it's not working, your life doesn't work."

The majority of managers say the same. Football is a unique 24/7 world, where there is very little time to switch off.

You certainly need to be a certain character to take on the job and deal with your week's work being played out in full view of the public. Even at Non-League level.

"Everything is out there to see," Gowling wrote. "It's on social media, in the news, if kids go to school in the area you manage, they might get some stick. There is no escape from the game."

That's partly why they all do it. Football gets under all our skin. However you interact with the game, it's because we love it.

Gowling also says being a manager is the best job in the world. And that is probably why so many come back to try again after they disappointments. That's football...

# AMERICAN DREAM

hen we think of football in the United States – and not the Super Bowl kind – we tend to think of it as a fairly modern invention. The North American Soccer League of the 1970s and 80s that attracted the likes of Pele, George Best, Johann Cruyff and, in a slightly bizarre turn of events, a young Peter Beardsley. After its demise, the MLS' faltering start and thus far successful revival after David Beckham's move to LA Galaxy. But soccer has a long history in the USA, and the first national league created was earlier than some of the top European leagues. The inaugural season of the American Soccer League kicked off in 1921.



Football in the USA goes back to the nineteenth century. In 1869, the representatives of Princeton and Rutgers Universities took part in one of the more pivotal games in sporting history. It has gone down as the first gridiron game in history. But the laws used that day were the FA's Laws of the Game,

and there was definitely spherical ball. This was a game of European football.

Football in the United States then filtered its way down to the working classes, exploding in popularity, especially among European immigrants. Teams started to spring up in American cities. By 1884 an American Football Association had been formed, just in time to prevent the formation of what would have been the first league, backed by the owners of Major League Baseball teams to give their players something to do in the winter. The AFA, even at this early stage, was unwilling to lose its control of the game.

They did, however, set up a cup for teams to compete in, This first organised competition drew teams from factory towns, usually made up of factory workers and often sponsored by the company. The first three were won by Clark ONT, owned by the Clark Thread Company. But then it was dominated by Fall River Rovers, who won six of the next seven. They were the only team to win both the American Cup and the later Challenge Cup, although the struggles of their parent company forced Rovers to withdraw by the start of the twentieth century.

Turmoil, it seemed, was catching. When the AFA applied for FIFA membership in 1912, a breakaway organisation (The American Amateur Football Association) applied at the same time. FIFA rejected both, needing just one governing body. The delay in FIFA affiliation did little to hurt the growth of the sport, but did not stop teams from as far afield as Third Lanark in Scotland and Hakoah Wien in Austria to embark on lucrative tours. Third Lanark won 24 of their 25 games in the United States,



eventually drawing the last against Fall River Rovers. Hakoah Wien, full of exciting central European talent drew record-breaking crowds and at least one of their players chose not to return to Austria at the end of the tour, finding the life of celebrity and riches too enticing to give up.

As the AAFA gained the upper hand over their rival federation, it changed its name to the USFA and, before eventually turning its attention to a league. The American Soccer League claimed to be a national competition, but because of travel difficulties in reality it was limited to the northeast. Not that this impacted on popularity. Football was never as popular as baseball, but it was very lucrative, and those riches were used to attract European players, much to European chagrin. As a result, early crowds in the tens of thousands threatened to make soccer America's

second sport, ahead of gridiron.

Sadly, as so often with football in America, it wasn't to be. The ASL fell out with the USFA when the latter tried to impose new rules to boost popularity even further. These American innovations included end of season playoffs and a league table sorted by winning percentage rather than points. Also, interestingly, the USFA wanted substitutions. The ASL conceded this and introduced them in 1926; the World Cup didn't allow substitutes until 1970.

In the end, the ASL initiated a boycott of the USFA's challenge cup. Three teams went against the boycott and were kicked out of the league, but the courts found in their favour. Rancour and disharmony within the sport smashed headlong into the collapsing American economy, and fans decided against spending what little they had watching football. By 1932, amid falling crowds and financial problems, the league eventually folded. But not before it sent a team to the first World Cup, to finish third, still the best finish for a team outside of Europe and South America.
