Before I get on to the football, let me get something off my chest. This is not sour grapes and I mean no disrespect to New Salamis, they took their chances well, capitalised well on our errors and



any side that score four goals against a top five team deserve the victory, however, running a football club is not only exhilarating, but is a bloody nightmare! Firstly, in any walk of life where humans are involved, there will be issues, be it personality clashes, lack of volunteers, financial issues, social media! And those making the rules. We work tirelessly to uphold standards, offer facilities that we can be proud of, fundraise endlessly to continuously stay ahead of the ever-increasing burden of rules and regulations that we as a club have to adhere to. We are not alone of course, everywhere we visit, our supporters are met with open arms, provided with

the facilities and hospitality that the league insist upon and that clubs willingly offer.

Ground grading is the same, we all have to follow certain (endless) standards and rules that allow a club to sustain a certain level of football, just ask Stowmarket what they had to do when promoted, with threat of relegation if deadlines were not met! So, my point is, how is it right that the home side are not, actually cannot, follow the rules? I won't dwell on the ones such as no advertised programme, no turnstiles in use, just a guy in the car park collecting the tenners, no tannoy in use for emergencies or team announcements, etc etc. But I will make a strong point about food, the attendance was advertised before kick off as 127, in reality there was approximately 53, that was about 37 from Felixstowe, a couple of neutrals I spoke to and just over a dozen home supporters, but after a long journey by coach and car, and no prior warning, there was no food available at the ground, at all, against the ground grading and league rules that state hot food must be available for purchase. Supporters travel a long way in this league and

should be able to rely on food being available in there approx. 10-hour day trip. We thanked the hard-working people who were there, but they admitted they simply do not have anyone to fulfil these requirements. As a volunteer myself, I feel for them, but if you are not in a position to offer and maintain the basic needs of football at senior level then sorry, but you shouldn't be allowed to remain in it. (My views, not those of Felixstowe & Walton United).





Back to the football! Felixstowe started with new signing Andy Fennell making his debut in a central forward position, Ollie Canfer was unavailable and George Clarke, Leon Ottley-Gooch and Stuart Ainsley remain out with injuries. New Salamis were missing 19 goal marksman Derek Asamoah.

Felixstowe started brightly on the 3G surface of Haringey Borough, but often found the final pass lacking when moving forward. New Salamis were playing on the break with Remi and Mandla looking particularly dangerous with their pace. Mandla headed tamely wide on 7 minutes before Noel Aitkens was denied at the near post with a challenge preventing his shot hitting the target. Callum Harrison curled a free kick round the wall and just past the post on 12 minutes, then one of the home sides quick breaks found a gap on the right to allow Remi to slam the ball in from close distance. Aitkens sent over a wonderful cross from deep on the right shortly after, it found Fennell in the box, he took the ball down well, turned and shot but was denied by a last gasp block. Despite all their possession and passing football, it was the home side who again stunned the away support on 25 minutes as they took a two-goal lead, Felixstowe again unable to defend a break on the right and Ryan Hervel slammed the ball home from 15 yards. The Seasiders went close twice on 30 minutes, firstly a cross heading for Fennell was headed backwards by a defender and missed the goal frame by inches, and then Billy Holland saw his header tipped over the





bar from the resultant corner. Joe Whight headed narrowly wide on 42 minutes but he was soon on the scoresheet, the assistant referee flagging for a clear handball from a corner as the referee blew the half time whistle. Salamis protests went overboard, as had been the case all afternoon, but **Joe Whight** stepped up and halved the deficit.

The feeling amongst the supporters at half time was that Felixstowe would now come back and win, but that confidence was shattered immediately when straight from kick off, yet another fast break on the right allowed Remi to score his second, the ball spinning in to the net off Callum Robinson's studs seemingly. Felixstowe were absolutely dominant (until the 89th minute) from there and wave after wave of attacks led to increasingly better chances for the away side, helped further when Salamis were reduced to ten men following Hervel's second yellow card. Callum Harrison's overhead kick flew just over the bar, Charlie Warren saw his 20-yard low effort tipped around the bottom corner and Henry Barley shot across the face of goal and wide as Felixstowe pressed. Harrison saw a shot deflected wide on 66 minutes and from the corner, Fennell opened his Seasiders account. The corner was headed onto the bar by Charlie Warren, the ball was only cleared a yard or two to **Fennell** who made the finish look easy.





Felixstowe were being roared on by their supporters and looked like scoring every time they went forward and on 81 minutes the equaliser came, Billy Holland's curling effort from outside the box struck the post and fell to **Sam Ford** who finished into the empty net. With the win looking likely for Felixstowe, they fell to an absolute sucker punch on 89 minutes, an attack broke down, allowing Remi to burst forward and his shot was deflected just wide by Robinson, from the corner Robinson caught the ball but the assistant referee adjudged him to have carried the ball over the line, and the goal was awarded, much to the disbelief of both sides. Noel Aitkens dissent led to a straight red card and the Seasiders could not find another equaliser in the five minutes added time.

THE OTHER SIDE LOW/ESTOFT TOW/N

Lowestoft Town have a fine history stretching back well over 100 years. The club is first recorded as East Suffolk F C with games, all friendlies in those days, recorded back in 1884. On merging with the original Kirkley club the title of Lowestoft was adopted in 1887 with 'Town' added in 1890.

When the Norfolk & Suffolk League was formed in 1897, providing the first inter-county competitive matches, Lowestoft dominated, winning the title 6 times in the first 7 years. The 'odd' season out 1899-1900 saw Lowestoft's attentions turn to the F Amateur Cup with victories over such famous names as Leytonstone (9-0), and Gt Marlow (1-0) on the way to the final which brought a 1-5 defeat by Bishop Auckland at Leicester.

In 1904 Lowestoft had to appear before a FA Commission to answer charges of professionalism after a testimonial had raised just under £5 for player Fred Timoney who was about to emigrate. Norwich City who had 'poached' 4 of Lowestoft's suc- cessful side amongst others were also called before the commission. Whilst City accepted the ruling and formally adopted professionalism to start on the road that has seen them up amongst the top clubs in the country, Lowestoft paid a restitution of 2 guineas to regain amateur status. In 1925 came the decision to adopt the blue and white colours that have served them so well since.

Lowestoft became founder members of the Eastern Counties League in 1935 but before starting out on this new challenge once again merged with local rivals Kirkley. The move proved a wise one with the first season seeing them sharing the title with Harwich & Parkston and then winning it outright 2 years later.

Lowestoft took the bold step of becoming



semi-professional in 1962. & 7 ECL titles and twice runners up in the following 9 seasons is clear testimony to the manner in which they dominated in those years.

The ECL title was again won in 1977/8. The 1980s saw a decline in the club's fortunes as crowds and income dropped. The unique club pavilion, originally the Yacht Club before being taken down and moved from the harbour to the Crown Meadow in 1902, was gradually falling into disrepair and the floodlighting system installed in 1964 was coming to the end of its lifespan. The floodlights were updated in 1986 and the new dressing room complex occupied in 1989 and at last attention could be paid to playing matters.

As playing fortunes declined a 19 year old local lad signed for the club in 1980 who was to figure prominently in the affairs of the club for the next 30 plus years. Micky Chapman soon became a favourite with his all action style, eye for the goal, long flowing hair and a genuine desire to bring success back to the club. 5 'Player of the Year' trophies adorn his display cabinet as testimony to the respect he has earned from supporters and players alike. The 1990s saw Micky progress from captain to as- sistant manager and finally manager in 1994.

A persistent back injury forced Mick to hang up his boots in 1997 allowing him to concentrate fully on the managerial side. With the unwavering support of successive chairmen Mick had been able to improve the side year by year. In February 2012 he took charge of his 1000th game as Lowestoft manager.

After several years in the doldrums the 21st century has seen Micky team up with Ady Gallagher to bring a return to trophy winning days with the Ridgeons League title won twice, the League Cup collected twice and the Suffolk Premier Cup brought back to the Meadow five times. The culmination of all that recent success came in May 2008 when joint managers Micky Chapman and Ady Gallagher proudly led their squad out onto the hallowed Wembley pitch in the F A Carlsberg Vase final. On a blazing hot Sunday afternoon in front of over 14,000 Lowestoft supporters, the Blues were in the lead for three quarters of the game before conceding a last minute goal to lose out to Kirkham & Wesham by the odd goal of three.

Season 2008-2009 saw the first team win a League and County Cup double, as well as reach the semi final of the F A Carls- berg Vase and the season ended with promotion to the Ryman League Division One North. Success continued unabated in 2009/10 with back to back promotions seeing the Blues soar to the Ryman Premier Division at the first attempt achieving a century of points and goals for the second consecutive season. An excellent F A Cup run saw the first round proper reached with the run ended at Wrexham by a cruel deflected goal in the final minutes.

The first season in the Ryman Premier Division saw the Trawlerboys involved in the promotion race right to the end. There was just 9 minutes of the season left when Tonbridge Angels scored the goal that gave them a 3-4 victory and ended Lowestoft's hopes of a third successive promotion. It was a similar story in the following 2 seasons with late goals in the Play Off final denying them promotion before the dream of Step 2 football was realised in 2014 with a play off victory over AFC Hornchurch and a 3rd promotion in 6 seasons.

Season 2014-2015 was one of consolidation in the highest sphere the club has ever reached and despite several early morning departures and a mere 8500 plus miles of travelling a satisfactory season ended with them holding a 16th place finish suffering just a single defeat in their final 13 fixtures. On top of this the Blues closed their season out by winning the Suffolk Premier Cup for the twelfth time; beating Whitton United 2-1 after extra time. It was also a season that marked the farewell of a true Lowestoft Town legend with Micky Chapman retiring after the last league game of the season at home to Barrow, who sealed the league title that day with a 3-2 victory over the Blues. After 32 years, 480 first team appearances, 193 goals, 1640 games and 147,600 plus minutes as a player, player/ manager and then manager during that time, it was the end of an era for a figure





who will forever be etched in the history of Lowestoft Town FC.

Season 2015-2016 saw Ady Gallagher in sole charge for the first time but a season plagued with injuries saw the Trawlerboys relegated on the last day of the season on goal difference bringing a return to the Ryman League Premier Division. Season 2016-2017 was to prove one of consolidation as they adjusted to life at step 3 in a season once again plagued with injuries.

Season 2017-2018 proved to be one of turmoil as firstly Ady Gallagher stepped down to be replaced by his assistant Dale Brooks. The club was then hit by financial problems which saw the departure of several leading players but Brooks achieved a minor miracle by avoiding relegation with the remnants of his squad aided by a bevy of youth loan signings and the clubs scholar's.

Brooks stepped down during the summer of 2018 to be replaced by two former players Jamie Godbold and Andy Reynolds who between themselves boast over 900 appearances for the Trawlerboys. Having to build a completely new side Godbold has had to cope with three season redevilled with injuries and covid resulting in relegation back to Step 4 and a move back across to the Isthmian League.

So a dozen years of non stop incident that has seen three promotions, three losing play off finals, 2 relegations and a 1st round proper venture and saw us travel as far north as Barrow, south as far as Bristol, west as far as Wrexham and Colwyn Bay sees as back to where this modern day adventure all started in the Isthmian League Division One North.

PLAYER PROFILES

JAMIE GODBOLD. (Manager) Former Lowestoft favourite who made exactly 500 appearances for the club as a player. He then started his managerial career which saw him learn the management ropes with Kirkley & Pakefield, AFC Sudbury and Wroxham before returning to his home town in the summer of 2018.

WARREN BURWOOD. Local boy who was released by Cardiff City in the summer of 2020 and joined Lowestoft Town at the start of this season once international clearance had been obtained. Made his debut in Suffolk Premier Cup final against Needham Market on 20th October 2020. 28 apps 0 goals.



SAM NUNN. Signed for Lowestoft for the second time in July 2002 from Felixstowe & Walton United. Strong central defender who has also played for Bury Town, Needham Market and Stowmarket Town. 26 apps 0 goals.

TRAVIS COLE. Local boy who signed a permanent deal with Lowestoft having been released by Ipswich in November 2016. Previously at Lowestoft on work experience. Debut away to Billericay Town on 23rd August 2016. 200 apps 22 goals.

ROBERT EAGLE. Re-signed for Lowestoft in the close season 2022 for his 4th spell with the Trawlerboys. Originally with Norwich City he first signed for Lowestoft from Grimsby in January 2012. Further short spells with Lowestoft came in 2017 and 2018. He made a scoring debut for Lowestoft in a Suffolk Premier Cup Quarter Final victory over Kirkley & Pakefield on 10th January 2012. 202 apps, 28 goals.

JOSH HARVEY. Currently a member of the Trawlerboys Scholars and has impressed sufficiently to be included in the first team squad. Debut away to Biggleswade Town on17th August 2021. 45 apps 11 goals

KYLE HAYLOCK. Attacking midfielder with an eye for goal. Developed through the youth system at Kirkley & Pakefield. After an excellent 2021-22 season he decided to take the step up and join the Trawlerboys in the summer of 2022. Debut as substitute against Stowmarket Town 16th August 2022. 19 apps, 6 goals. **CHRIS HENDERSON**. Goalscoring midfielder now in his second spell with Lowestoft after helping Kings Lynn Town to 2 promotions. Just back after a year out with health issues. 272 apps 67 goals.

DAVID HINTON. Experienced central midfielder signed from Dereham Town in the summer of 2022. Formerly skipper of the Magpies he is a born leader on and off the pitch. Debut away to Gt Wakering Rovers 13 August 2022. 20 apps 0 goals.

Leaders Hashtag United travelled to Tilbury looking to cement their NINETEENTH consecutive win and make the Dockers plight in the bottom four worse still - and they had the match won by half time, at which point they were four goals ahead and out of sight. Indeed they had the game won after less than half of the first half, Jermaine Francis on fifteen minutes. Pedro Carvalho on nineteen and Olly Miles on twenty two putting them three-nil up. Miles made it four, six minutes prior to half time, and soon after the restart Francis got his second of the afternoon to make it five. Chris Millar gave the Dockers faithful something to shout about, albeit quietly, pulling a goal back on the hour, but that just provoked the Tags to add a sixth, Nathan Smith with that one. Smith made it seven ten minutes from time, and right at the end Francis got his hat trick with an EIGHTH for the Tags.

Darnell Kithambo struck back for the ten men ten minutes after the restart, but that was no more than a consolation, and the Seed Growers are now seven points from safety.

Heybridge Swifts, in fifth place at kick off, travelled to a fast-improving **Gorleston** and found themselves two behind at the break, Connor Ingram and Jacek Zielonka with the goals for the Greens. The visitors made a game of it when Quba Gordon got one back with twenty five minutes remaining, but with the next goal all-important it went to the hosts, Ross Gilfedder with a third with only eight minutes left. The Greens open up a five point gap over the bottom four.

Wroxham and Grays Athletic, both in good form as the Essex side arrived on the Norfolk Broads, couldn't manage a goal between them in the first half. Another forty minutes went by goalless, and then a penalty to Athletic was converted by Sam Bantick and right at the end the visitors got another, Damani Hunter making it two and ensuring that his side ended the day in the top five.

Five without a win and hoping to get their promotion chances back on track, **Stowmarket**

Town travelled to **East Thurrock United** and went ahead just after a quarter of an hour, Alfie Cutbush cutting through the Rocks defence. Harry Hope delivered an equaliser right at the end, but there was still time for a winner, and it went to the visitors, Luke Upson sealing three points for Stow.

Seven unbeaten, **Brentwood Town** travelled to **Maldon & Tiptree** looking to make it eight – and two early goals from Solomon Ogunwomoju and Flavio Jumo meant they looked comfortable with only a quarter of an hour gone. That turned out to be that, and the Blues are tenth, the Jammers down in fourteenth after a run of only one win from their last eight.

Managerless **Bury Town**, who hadn't scored in six matches, managed a goal in twelve minutes of their clash at **Basildon United** - but sadly for the travelling faithful it was at the wrong end. The Bees doubled their advantage by scoring one themselves, Michael Salako making it two just after the half hour, but the visitors finally managed a goal of their own with twenty three minutes remaining, Cemal Ramadan making a game of it. It mattered little, Anisius Lewis soon adding a third for the Bees, who are now thirteen points clear of the bottom four and have surely put any relegation fears behind them after a third consecutive win.

Witham Town welcomed a Great Wakering Rovers side who were without a win since October 8th. Witham's man of the moment. Michael Bareck, got his fifth goal in six matches to give his side an early lead, but Rovers struck back and were ahead at the break, Jacob Bland and Perry Dunn giving them hope. Rovers wait for a win looked as if it would have to go on even longer, however, as Rash Salau grabbed an equaliser with six minutes left, only five minutes after entering from the bench. Liam Whipps was then dismissed for the hosts, and perhaps that proved critical, as Warren Keyembe came on from the bench and immediately converted a penalty to give Wakering a crucial win. Tey stay bottom, but seven points from safety.

THE BEAUTY of Non-League football – and indeed this job at The NLP – is the vast array of characters it brings together.

Preston Edwards has long become one of my favourite players to interview. From his England C debut against Portugal in 2011, to later captaining the Three Lions and winning five promotions down the years, we've talked about the lot over the last decade – even his transition from the full-time game into becoming a maths teacher.

Edwards won the Isthmian Premier play-offs with Cheshunt last season to add to his successes with Dover, Ebbsfleet (twice) and Dulwich Hamlet.

Non-League footballers may not command the largest headlines – although Edwards was one famously sent off after just ten seconds playing for Ebbsfleet against Farnborough – but they stand on a unique platform where they can really make an impact.

Our most recent chat was hardly anything to do with the ups and downs of the beautiful game. Instead it was about Edwards' determination to raise awareness of autism.

On April 23, he's running the London Marathon to raise money for the National Autistic Society, a charity close to his heart.

Edwards' four-year-old son Rios has been diagnosed with autism and the Ambers stopper wants to help improve people's understanding and perceptions.

"My son is autistic – the media portrays autism that they are either really smart or they can't operate properly and people don't really know what autism means where they are kind of in the middle," Edwards tells The NLP. "My son is not extremely bright and he doesn't have things like a speech delay.

"It's just that he struggles to understand some things and socially he's awkward. I want to spread more awareness and create that inclusive environment.

"There is nothing worse than seeing people left out just for the way they are born rather than the person they actually are.

"My son is obviously the best thing that's ever happened to me. I just want the best for him."

He continues: "People don't understand the challenges parents have to go through with an autistic child. My son has to have a very set routine every single day. If something is not in his routine, it messes up his whole day.

"People don't understand that change. It has humbled me in a sense. I've had to adapt as a parent. In my head when he was born I was like, 'Right, he's going to be a footballer'.

"But you now realise that the most important thing for myself and my wife is he is independent in life. He's able to do things himself and be the best version for him."

Edwards believes there are many misconceptions around autism. Since Rios' diagnoses, he has learnt as much as he can about the lifelong developmental disability which affects how people communicate and interact with the world and even become autism coordinator at the school where he is a maths teacher.

And it's why he wants to raise money by taking on one of the world's greatest marathons. "The National Autistic Society are the biggest autism awareness group in the country," he says.

"They do lots of things, they come to my school and make our children really aware of it. They are very good with the students. It's trying to place that in other educational groups and adults as well, because adults are not really aware.

"For example, if I go to a park, my son sometimes doesn't have the understanding where the sense of danger is. They feel they need to move their child away because he's dangerous. But he's not. He's just loud.

"Listen I understand. It's your son or daughter. But they're not dangerous. They are human beings."

PLAYING FOR THE ENEMY

Johan Cruyff was perhaps the most influential footballer of the twentieth century. His playing career, taking on a talismanic role for both Ajax and Barcelona, and the Dutch national team, saw the development of Total Football, from which possession football became the standard, beating the previously unstoppable Italian catenaccio. As a manager of the same clubs, he developed his style yet further, ingraining it into the young players at both clubs, including a fascinated Pep Guardiola. But lesser known about the enigmatic genius is his time playing for the enemy. With his second spell in Amsterdam coming to an end, but not willing to call time on his playing career, Cruyff made the move no Ajax fan could countenance; he moved to arch-rivals Feyenoord.

Johan Cruyff was on a high in the summer of 1983. Heading into the swansong of a glittering career, he had just helped him boyhood club to a league and cup double, and was looking forward to a final farewell



season to round off his time on the pitch. After leaving for Barcelona a decade earlier, and having spent a few years bouncing around the United States, he was home, and he was settled. It was something of a shock, then, when the club informed him that they no longer had a place for him. He had served his purpose, he had won them everything they wanted, and he was being put out to pasture.

At least, that's what his employers in Amsterdam thought. Cruyff was never one to go alone with anybody else's plan. He had missed the 1978 World Cup, which the Netherlands had been huge favourites to win, with rumours that he refused to play in front of the Argentinian military junta. Without him, they lost the final to the hosts. With him, who knows what might have been. So, when his club, for whom he was a legend, for whom he had won everything up to and including the European Cup, tried to end his career early, he moved 35 miles to Rotterdam, and signed for their biggest rivals.

Feyenoord were not the same team that had won the European Cup in 1970. Ajax had far surpassed them, and the likes of PSV and AZ Alkmaar were threatening their position, while they spent the first years of the 1980s recording mid-table positions. Not that this encouraged fans, or the staff, that Cruyff should be joining. The press conference announcing the signing was a tepid affair, with Cruyff, his new manager, and the chairman all looking like they wondered if it was a mistake. The Feyenoord supporters certainly believed so, providing the hostile atmosphere at De Kuip



that Cruyff had become used to as an Ajax player, when he ran out as a home player for the first time. 'Feyenoord Forever, Cruyff Never' read the banner some fans hung, and that was on the softer side of the abuse he received.

The way to win fans over, as Cruyff well knew, was playing well. Feyenoord started the season on fire, winning five of their first six games, as Cruyff got to know his new teammates, including a 21 year old Ruud Gullit. It was another shock, then, when they went to Amsterdam. A hostile atmosphere, with a game marred by crowd trouble, saw the hosts run out massive 8-2 winners. But Cruyff was tenacious, and he carried a grudge. He used the defeat as motivation, as Feyenoord responded with a 15 game unbeaten spell. They slipped to defeat against Groningen, not long before the return fixture against their nemeses.

Ajax travelled to De Kuip still hopeful that another win could derail Feyenoord's title bid. But this time, things were different. An early goal from Gullit, and then a lovely finish by Cruyff, set the league leaders on their way. Ajax couldn't get near them, and fell to a 4-1 defeat. Feyenoord wouldn't lose again to the end of the season, wrapping up the title. Just to add the icing to the cake, Cruyff also led his team through the ponderous rounds fo the Dutch Cup. Having won the double with Ajax, and been told that his time with the club was over, he led their faltering arch-rivals to the same achievement. And then, on his own terms, he left the field of play. His influence and his legacy have continued for the forty years since, but his playing days were over.
