Felixstowe & Walton United made it 13 points from a possible 15 away from home in 2023 with another away win at Maldon & Tiptree. **Josh Hitter** took his goal tally to five in a week and thirteen

for the season with a second half brace to seal a comeback win and another vital three points towards the playoff goal. Unfortunately, the victory was marred by a serious looking knee injury late in the game for George Clarke, with the forward stretchered off and taken to hospital.

The Seasiders were without Noel Aitkens, Leon Ottley-Gooch and Stuart Ainsley, but did welcome back Harry Knock to the bench after injury. Callum Harrison started with Henry Barley

and George Clarke coming on as second half substitutes.

Felixstowe were up against a strong, swirling wind off the Estuary in the first half and any attempt to play the ball above head height was thwarted by the elements, despite the conditions, it was still the away side that started the stronger with Zak Brown, Callum Harrison and Ollie Canfer all getting into the box within the first 7 minutes but seeing their crosses cleared. Maldon shot far and wide over the bar on 8 minutes before a subdued home support staged a protest against their manager, former England boss Peter Taylor, on 11 minutes. That did not halt the game and Felixstowe continued to press for the opener, which looked to have come on 20 minutes. Ollie Canfer rose on the penalty spot to attempt a challenge on the home goalkeeper, before the challenge was made the ball was dropped and Dixon-Hedge fell to the ground, allowing Canfer to slot the ball into the empty net. Unfortunately, the referee had blown his whistle instantaneously and to the incredulity of the large away support, the goal was disallowed. 4 minutes later and it was Josh Hitter coming close when he intercepted a cross over from the far left, took it down well and struck the near post with his shot as the



keeper bore down on him. Maldon had offered very little going forward thus far but as usual in this league, teams can always find a way into the game and a 5-minute spell against the run of play had Maldon ahead by one goal, but should have been by two. Firstly, on 28 minutes a home break down the right saw Felixstowe gain and then lose the ball in a dangerous position and the home forward burst into the box from an angle and fired across the goal, beating Robinson but striking the inside of the far post, flying back across the six yard box before being cleared, 5 minutes later and the goal did come, another cross from the right was sent back across the box to give Michael Finneran the simple task of converting. Billy Holland didn't care about the wind and he tried one of his trademark





attempts from inside his own half on 30 minutes, worrying the goalkeeper for a few seconds before he recovered and caught the ball as it was about to level things up. Andre Hasanally then saw his wind-assisted cross curl just past the far post as the half drew to a close.

Felixstowe looked to be heading for a frustrating afternoon as the home defence

held firm for the start of the second half, Maldon happy to try and mop up everything the Seasiders were throwing at them whilst creating absolutely nothing going forward.

Zak Brown. Canfer and Hasanally all tried to pierce the defensive line with some clever football before Josh Hitter popped up with the equaliser on 60 minutes. A cross over from the right found Hitter alone on the far side of the six-vard box, he outwitted the keeper and fired into the roof of the net from an almost impossible angle to the delight of the away following. Felixstowe sensed the win now and strode forward confidently at every opportunity. Hasanally created space on the left and curled a great shot just past the far post on 62 minutes before **Hitter** scored what turned out the winner on 68 minutes Ollie Canfer sent over the cross of the season that evaded the keeper by swinging back out to the incoming Hitter who smashed in his header from a central position. The home side finally sparked to life on 80 minutes, but it took a serious injury to George Clarke that broke up another good Felixstowe move and allowed the Jammers

to break. Clarke went down on the edge of the Maldon area, possibly getting his studs caught in the turf? And was clearly in a great deal of pain. With the home goalkeeper immediately calling for assistance for George, the referee carried on play and the home forward saw his shot brilliantly save by Callum Robinson as a goal looked a certainty, with a follow up effort going just over the bar. An 8-minute break in play whilst Clarke was treated and stretchered off the pitch made for a slightly less comfortable finish to the game but Maldon were out of ideas and it was Callum Harrison who very nearly wrapped up the match deep into added time, beating the offside trap and rounding the goalkeeper before perhaps taking one touch too many that allowed the keeper and a defender to recover and challenge before the ball could be slotted home.

Not many people know this!

While today quite rightly marks the passing of club legend Ray Stanbridge, it can also mark the passing of Ray's mate Ron Churchyard, who lost his battle with cancer on the 10th December, less than 6 weeks after Ray. There was also a third loss to the club the day after Ray on November 13th when former committee man Mick Packham passed away peacefully at home.

I had the privilege of being good friends of all three, and Christmas 2022 was a sad period for me as I mourned their loss but yet remembering them all for the good times we all had together - each in their own way contributed greatly to the club over the last 50 years and their passing should not go unnoticed...

Sadly, this page looks like becoming an obituary column as we learnt that Dennis Simmonds, brother of club director Jimmy, had also passed away. For those who didn't know Dennis, he was not only a friend of the club, occasional watcher & visitor but was



also instrumental in helping the club get & install the Defibrillator, attached to the wall of the club on the cricket side... a piece of equipment that has proved to be crucial in helping save the lives of three members of the public to date.

So... as we salute Ray, we give a nod to those others who are no longer with us, and say 'Thanks for the memories'...

I couldn't let Ray's passing go without at least one anecdote from those days when we were young -

Mid 1970's (75 I think) we had a midweek away game near the end of season when we were in with a chance of winning the Essex & Suffolk Border League. Our opponents were Wivenhoe Town (village) and they were then playing on the Essex University ground, a vast area with multiple pitches, we needed at least a point to have any chance of winning the league.

80 minutes in its 1-1, Ray's playing at centre half, collects a loose ball and sets off on a dribbling run (an old term) until he gets to the halfway line on the touchline and then kicks the ball as hard as he could toward a little bunch of trees some 100 plus yards away, and off it sails on the wind, into the distance. One of the home side's staff goes chasing after it while Ray trots back to his centre half position as everyone stares at him in disbelief.

Play resumes after a couple of minutes with a Wivenhoe throw and as 90 minutes approaches Ray again gets the ball and does a repeat, this time kicking it even further. The ball's retrieved and as the throw in is taken, the ref blows for full time.

We drew 1-1.

THE OTHER SIDE

Wroxham FC were established in 1892 by GE Preston, a former captain of the Norfolk County team, and initially played on Wroxham Park. The club played friendly matches until joining the East Norfolk League and the Norwich City Junior League. In 1935 they joined the East Anglian League, before dropping down to the Norwich and District League in the 1950s, a time during which they suffered a record 24-0 defeat.

In 1963 the club became founder members of the Anglian Combination. A successful spell during the mid-1970s saw the club rise through the divisions. In 1975 the club won its first major trophy, the Norfolk Junior Cup. The following season they won Division Two, and the season after, Division One. In 1981 the club won the Knock-Out Cup, and in 1981-82 they won the Premier Division, retaining the title in 1982-83, 1983-84 and 1984-85, also winning the knock-out cup in 1983 and 1985. They did another league and cup double in 1986-87

In 1988 the club joined the newly formed Division One of the Eastern Counties League. They won the division in their first season, beating Halstead Town to the title on goal difference. After finishing twelfth in their first season in the Premier Division, the club have never finished lower than eighth. They won the title with a record 99 points in 1991-92, before beating their own record with 100 points and another title the following season, the club's centenary, in which they also won the League Cup and the Norfolk Senior Cup. In 1993-94 they won a third consecutive title. After a gap of two seasons, the club won the Premier Division again with 109 points in 1996-97, also winning the Senior Cup again. They retained the title and the Senior Cup in 1997-98, before winning the League for a third time in a row in 1998-99.

Wroxham won the Norfolk Senior Cup again in 2000, 2002, 2004, the Premier Division



in 2006-07, and the Senior Cup again in 2008. In 2009-10 the club reached the final of the FA Vase but lost 6-1 to holders Whitley Bay. In 2015, in a thrilling Norfolk Senior Cup Final, they beat local rivals Dereham Town 3-2 after extra time.

Since the club was formed, Wroxham F.C. have played at several venues. The first was just off Norwich Road and subsequent grounds were at The Avenue and Keys Hill. The Avenue ground has now reverted to agricultural use, whilst the others have been built upon.

Around the time of World War II, Wroxham moved to their current ground, Trafford Park, a field close to the railway line in Skinners Lane. The club took with them an old timber pavilion that was erected and used as a primitive clubhouse. Fifteen years later this was replaced by prefabricated buildings, which were themselves flattened to make way for a new permanent clubhouse that was opened in 1994.

The current main stand, the Les King Stand, was built in 1990, replacing an earlier structure that had stood on the same site for around 10 years. The capacity at Trafford Park is 2,000 but the record attendance to date is 1,262 for the FA Vase semi-final against Whitehawk in 2010.

Wroxham finally took the opportunity to take promotion to Step 4 joining the Isthmian Division 1 North in season 2012/13 and played for 5 seasons with mixed fortunes.

After a disappointing 2016-17 season, The Yachtsmen returned to Step 5 with a new management team of Ross Potter & Tom Parke. After a promising start the team were soon out of the prestigious FA Cup failing for the first time in 22 years to get past the first hurdle. Form dipped around mid-season as the more experienced partnership of Jamie Godbold & Andy Reynolds were brought in. While we reached the semi-final of the League Cup, eventually losing to Brantham Athletic, League form remained erratic and we finished 13th in the table. This was the lowest finish we have ever had in the Eastern Counties Premier Division.



Goldbold & Reynolds shocked the club by announcing they would be leaving to join their old club Lowestoft Town. The Board acted quickly by appointing Reserve Manager Jordan Southgate assisted by ex-Norwich City Hall of Fame player Adam Drury, to take charge. They put together a youthful squad an finished a credible 7th in 2018/19.

Behind the scenes Club Chairman Lee Robson has done an amazing job developing a Wroxham Juniors section with teams at most age group from U7 to U18. With a strong Academy and U18's we hope to develop players who want to play the Wroxham way for the future. Wroxham saw Women's football for the first time at the Club with an Eastern Region Premier Division team (formerly Acle United) gracing Trafford Park.


2019/20 saw the Yachtsmen finish the truncated campaign in fifth place (although the League subsequently declared all results void) having hovered around the runner-up spot for much of the season, conceding only 18 goals in 25 matches – a total bettered only by table-topping Stowmarket Town. However, the Club's major successes of the season came in the FA Vase with a run to the quarter final. Two home attendances of around 1000. against Stowmarket Town in the 5th Round and Bitton AFC in the quarter final, generated much local interest and raised the profile of the Club regionally. Prior to the cessation of all football the Yachtsmen were defeated by Dereham Town in the semi-final of the Norfolk Senior Cup.

The 2020/21 campaign was also curtailed by COVID despite us leading the table with 10 straight wins.

We were not promoted to the Isthmian League until last season when we finished 2nd to Gorleston but went up as one of the top 10 Step 5 clubs on a Points Per Game analysis by The FA.

With some exciting young signings, allied to the experience already at the Club, it is hoped that the progress of the past few seasons can be maintained and bettered.

We've run out of superlatives to describe the performances of **Hashtag United**, and last night they picked up their seventeenth consecutive win to go four points clear at the top of the table - but they had to fight, because hosts **Coggeshall Tow**n certainly didn't gift wrap victory for their visitors.



The Seed Growers started well, but were undone by the in-form Toby Aromolaran, who delivered his tenth goal of the season midway through the first half, finding the bottom corner. Town hit back, hitting the post, but of course the ball was soon up the other end and Alex Teniola decided it was time for him to score his thirteenth of the campaign and give the visitors a cushion. Emmanuel Okunja almost gave the visitors breathing space when striking the post with sixteen minutes to go, but instead they had to weather a storm, Josh Osude getting one back four minutes later. More pressure at both ends came to naught, and the Tags had that crucial three points.

Much of our fixture list focused on battles at the wrong end of the table. One exception saw **Brentwood Town**, under new management, try to get off to a winning start under Craig Shipman as **New Salamis** came to call- but both sides had to be satisfied with a point. Matt Cripps gave his new boss a flying start, opening the scoring for Town on twelve minutes, but they held the lead only for twenty two minutes more before Derek Asamoah equalised - and that turned out to be that.

East Thurrock United haven't given up their promotion ambitions just yet, and the Rocks eased to three points against bottom side Great Wakering Rovers. Johnny Ashman started things off with a fifth minute opener, Harry Hope scored a second on twenty





minutes, and that turned out to be that. Thurrock are now five unbeaten, whilst Rovers are without a win since October 8th.

Maldon & Tiptree travelled to take on Basildon United. The Bees had gone seven matches without a win, and that run is now up to eight as the Jammers got the only goal of the game nine minutes from time. Michael Finneran scored it, and it means the visitors open up a five point gap on their fifteenth place hosts, the Bees falling a place but remaining five points clear of the bottom four.

Tilbury, only a point above the drop zone, welcomed the side one place and four points above them, Witham Town - but that was two places and seven points by full time. The Dockers had only one win and eight defeats from their previous ten matches, and both of those numbers increased by one as Town grabbed two first half goals to seal victory. Abdul-Rasheed Ajana-Salaugot the opener

just before the half hour, and three minutes later Michael Bareck continued his fine start to his Witham career by scoring his third goal in three matches.

Finally, we had a bottom four battle as **Gorleston** welcomed **Hullbridge Sports**. The Greens were four without a win, whilst Sports had lost eight of their last nine, so this one was incredibly important to both sides and it ended in a comfortable victory for the hosts, who move level on points with their visitors and find themselves a point from safety. Connor Deeks opened the scoring on the hour, and nine minutes later Jacek Zielonka made it two, fifteen minutes after emerging from the bench. The substitute added a third eight minutes from time, and that was that.

SOMETHING very special is unfolding right before our eyes in the National League – and it's likely to raise the bar for many years to come.

For the last few weeks at NLP Towers, we've cautiously held off talking about a "two-horse race" for the title but gripping late drama on Saturday felt like a decisive moment.

The first twist in the tale came at Huish Park where, held 1-1 by Yeovil Town, Notts County appeared to be struggling in pursuit of a sixth straight National League victory. But, with five minutes to go, the ruthless league leaders managed to find a way through, courtesy of Ruben Rodrigues, and then clicked through the gears in stoppage-time with top scorer Macaulay Langstaff adding two more to complete a rather comfortable – if not flattering - 4-1 victory.

It was the same also at Aldershot Town's EBB Stadium where Notts' title rivals Wrexham were similarly not having things their own way.

Two-nil and 3-1 leads were quickly cancelled out by the stubborn Shots but the Hollywood finish was pure box office - a 96th-minute winner from substitute Sam Dalby helping the Red Dragons to a dramatic 4-3 victory.

Defeat for Woking at Altrincham and Chesterfield's failure to beat Solihull Moors meant that the gap between second and third was extended to a mind-boggling 17 points and, given the form of these two big guns, it would take a huge turnaround in order for that deficit to be clawed back. Saturday's finale also put the National League statisticians on red alert.

As it stands, no fewer than FOUR longlasting league records could potentially be broken this season – and maybe even by a team who could still be playing Non-League football next year!

With only one automatic place up for grabs, it is still very much all to play for. Failure to finish on top of the summit will not only mean that the runners-up will have a psychological setback to recover from, but also a gruelling two-legged play-off semi-final and final to overcome if they are to, at long last, fulfil their promotion aspirations.

The first major National League record in sight of the top two is for Most Points in a Season. Crawley Town's best of 105, set in 2010-11, is in grave danger of being surpassed by both Notts and Wrexham, who are closing on three figures with a quarter of the season still left to play.

As it stands, County led the way with 83 points from 34 matches, while Wrexham trail by five with two games more to play. They are still a way off but on current points-pergame ratio both would end the season on 112 points.

The last time the top two ended on the same points was way back in 1991-92, while no two teams have ever finished the season with 100+ points. History may well be beckoning. Another long-standing record under serious threat is most Wins in a Season.

With the total of 31, first achieved by Aldershot Town in 2007-08, has stood for 15 years. Crawley, in 2010-11 and Fleetwood, in 2011-12, both took a share, but it has never been surpassed.

County, currently with 25, need just seven wins from 12 games to take the record outright, while Wrexham need eight from 14. With wins and points come goals – and that is another area which separates these two from the rest.

A hat-trick at Huish Park on Saturday and two more against Southend United on Tuesday night, took Langstaff's tally for the season to 32 - an incredible feat for a striker enjoying his first season in the top-flight since joining from Gateshead in National League North in the summer.

Closest rival Paul Mullin followed up his brace for Wrexham at Aldershot on Saturday with two more against Scunthorpe United on Tuesday night, taking his league tally for the season to 26, although the 28-year-old former Cambridge United hitman has bagged eight more in the FA Cup.

Both are in pursuit of Ricky Miller's incredible total of 40 for Dover Athletic back in 2016/17. Langstaff needs eight goals from 12 games, Mullin a goal a game from Wrexham's remaining 14.

With these two hitman, and others, on fire, it's no surprise to see both Notts County and Wrexham chasing the team goal totals too.

This is the record which stands longest of all with no one able to topple the total of 103 set by Barnet in 1990–91 and equalled by Hereford in 2003-04. However, with Notts County currently on 88 and Wrexham on 83, this the one mark most likely to be toppled.

It's been almost a decade since any side hit the 100-goal mark but, at the current goals-per-game ratio, both Notts and Wrexham would bag 119!

It's fair to say both of these big guns have given the National League plenty in the way of entertainment this season - but their lasting legacy to the Non-League game may offer English football's fifth tier a whole new dimension for the future.

The EFL chief executive Rick Parry revealed this week they are finally considering introducing a third promotion spot for National League clubs. These ridiculous numbers can only help strengthen that argument.

'BLACK MAN WITH THE WHITE FACE'

ir Stanley Matthews is arguably the greatest footballer England has ever produced. The first ever winner of the Ballon d'Or, he played first division football until he was 50 - still a record - and is the only player to have been knighted whilst still playing. He is also the only player to have had an FA Cup final named after him, unfortunately for Stan Mortensen who became the first player in over half a century to score a hat-trick in the Matthews Final of 1953. But what is less well known about the Wizard of the Dribble is his work against prejudice and racism. A signatory of a letter opposing racism and defending racial equality whilst still a player, when he hung up his boots he headed for the febrile and volatile atmosphere of apartheid South Africa.

'Our Stan', as he was affectionately known. already had history with African football, having developed his own celebrity during the Second World War. Clean eating, never booked, the consummate gentleman, Matthews was a propagandist's dream to compare to fascism, and a series of exhibition matches were held across the empire to improve morale. From 1953, he travelled to the continent every summer to coach kids, even turning down a recall to the England squad for the 1958 World Cup so that he could. In 1956, he played an exhibition in newly independent Ghana, having been invited by President Nkrumah to aid the development of a national character, ironically, free of British influence. So when he arrived in South Africa, he knew what he was walking in to.

For perhaps the first time in his life, Matthews

disregarded the rules. Flagrantly. Apartheid

South Africa allowed the coachina of children. but an all black team was forbidden.

Understanding the attention that his name brought, and correctly gambling that the South African government would want to avoid the international attention that arresting the first footballing celebrity might bring, he brought some players together in Soweto and put them all in the same kit. Too modest to have named them himself, they became known as Stan's Men, and they had as big an impact on South African football as anyone.

In order to train his team. Matthews needed to flout the rules again. White people were banned from the townships into which the black population had been forced, but that wouldn't stop him. Every week, without fail, he would make his way into Orlando township to impart the wisdom of his significant experience. But he learned also, what it was like to be black in South Africa, how the





country worked, and most pertinently, what a dream it would be for his players to play against Brazil. Fortunately, the name Sir Stanley Matthews still opened a few doors, and just as importantly, attracted funding.

Black South Africans had their international travel so severely restricted that it was effectively banned, and needed a permit to move around even inside the country. But in 1975 Matthews arranged a tour of the three times World Champions by Stan's Men. Again, wanting to avoid an international incident, the South African government made an exception for him, though that didn't prevent high levels of anxiety. 'At the airport I was riddled with nerves...' Matthews would later write. 'Large, forbidding men in light blue suits and dark glasses with inscrutable looks on their faces watched our every move.' Some reports claim there was even a spy on the plane. But, without trouble, Sir Stanley and his young charges boarded, and became the first black team to tour outside of South Africa.

Their first game was against Gama Filho University, and was an embarrassing 8-0 defeat. But that didn't really matter. A few days later, having adjusted, Stan's Men improved to a 2-2 draw. More importantly for the players were the training sessions, with Brazilian giants like Flamengo, Fluminense and Vasco de Gama. They met the legendary Zico and learned from the best in the world, and enjoyed Copacabana Beach. Matthews also met the infamous Ronnie Biggs during the tour, who had found his way to South America after the



Great Train Robbery. Even the most notorious of criminal was caught in the starlight that Sir Stanley Matthews brought.

Upon returning from Brazil, the team was disbanded and the players subject to death threats by those desperate to reiterate to them the way things were at that time in South Africa. Matthews returned to England, but his stand against racism, in the only way he knew, was not forgotten. He shone a light on apartheid, while giving young black players a chance to live their dreams. He spoke of all that football had given him, and the desire to give it back, but perhaps Stan's Men captain Gilbert Malloa captured the experience better than anyone when he called Matthews 'black man with a white face'.
